John 3:1-21

Central Idea: To B.L.E.S.S. your neighbors, Jesus invites you to share your story.

Introduction: Storytelling is an art. Every great story has characters, a setting, a plot, a conflict, and a resolution. The character is who the story is about, and the setting is the place where it happens. The plot is the beginning, middle, and the end of the story. Can we really bless our neighbors and friends and change the world without words? You likely won't help anyone discover the love of God without using your words—and your story.
